

Welcome to the Vital Signs* Report, published by the WindsorEssex Community Foundation (WECF) in partnership with Community Foundations of Canada (CFC). The Vital Signs* Report is a snapshot of life in Windsor-Essex County that uses local research and data to measure the vitality of our community. By identifying strengths and trends in 11 key issue areas, Vital Signs* touches on all aspects of our daily lives and allows us to better understand our community. Our goal is to gather data from a broad and diverse selection of community members to better understand the needs of our overall community.

Each year, we conduct the Vital Signs* Survey and publish the Vital Signs* Report as an informational resource for our community. We use this as an opportunity to share with the community what makes Windsor-Essex County a great place to live, work, play, and grow. The Vital Signs* Report helps to build community knowledge, inform community investments, and identify strategic priorities. We use the Vital Signs* Report to help guide our grant-making process, based on what our community has told us are their priority areas. We want to facilitate giving where the need is greatest, and the Vital Signs* Program helps us to do just that.

This year, we simplified the survey questions to better highlight our community's core impressions of each issue area, making it easier for respondents to share their perspectives. New for 2025, the "What Your Said" section includes select pieces of additional feedback provided by survey participants, offering a deeper look into the lived experiences and voices behind the data.

Overall, the Report shows that while Windsor-Essex is doing well in many areas, there is still room for improvement.





It supports around 12,000 residents by offering more than 4,900 housing units for seniors, families, and individuals in need of affordable accommodation. wechc.com



in Windsor and Essex County cast ballots in advance polls during the 2025 Federal Election. **32%** of elligible voters turned out to the polls in the last Municipal election, in 2022, with women and people of colour even further underrepresented.




